

A WORD FROM SBTHP

As we close out our fifty-sixth year and begin our fifty-seventh, we continue the promise of our mission statement. These are the words that guide and focus our purpose. Our mission statement is highly reflective of our work throughout the County of Santa Barbara and our special partnership with California State Parks, and we celebrate our many accomplishments.

We are privileged at SBTHP to serve as stewards of many of Santa Barbara County and the State of California's significant cultural resources. In addition to our preservation work to ensure that these resources survive for future generations, we seek to ensure that they are available today to the public in myriad ways. Serving a robust national and international audience is a priority for our organization and we continue to explore ways to reach new and underserved stakeholders. As you will see in the enclosed content, our partnerships continue to thrive. This year we celebrated our continued relationship with the Folk Orchestra of Santa Barbara, but also created new relationships, significantly with faculty at Santa Barbara Junior High for the History & Relevancy Project's "Where We Are From" pilot program. Our many festivals, Asian American Film Series, school tours and programs continue to grow in audience. This year we implemented a new strategic focus on evaluation at all programs to help us better understand who we are serving, what their expectations are, and how to better measure the impact of this important community work.

Our preservation of Santa Barbara's special places involved some important planning efforts, and some dramatic visible changes in 2019. We advanced the 1871 Cota-Knox House restoration project at El Presidio de Santa Bárbara State Historic Park with a new rendering of the completed project, proposed restoration plans and a topographic survey, and held a successful site visit for stakeholders. In addition, we began the first phase of repair work on 131-137 E. De la Guerra Street. This 1920s commercial building in El Presidio SHP houses four small businesses and a residence and contributes to the vitality of the Presidio Neighborhood. We are pleased to be repairing its beautiful façade and ensuring the building's continued contributions to the character of Santa Barbara's downtown. Work will be completed in early 2020.

All of this is only possible with many individuals working in unison. The Board of Trustees provides the governance needed to keep the organization vital. The Executive Committee assures the succession of leadership and attention to details. Our staff keeps everything humming along, pitching in wherever needed to assure success. Equally devoted are our volunteers, the only interaction some of our visitors enjoy. All of us pulling in the same direction guarantees our continued success.

We look forward to sharing our work with all of you in the year ahead.


